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FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK

VANILLA – A MOST SOUGHT AFTER SPICE

Among the food flavours, vanilla has a prime position. It is the second most expensive spice traded in the world market next only to saffron. Vanilla beans are primarily used as flavourants in the food industry. The dairy industry is the largest consumer of vanilla extracts followed by the confectionery, baking and beverage industries. There is an alarming demand for natural vanillin. The total area under vanilla in the world during the year 2001 was 40,846 ha with production of 5,583 MT. The major vanilla producing countries are Madagascar, Comoro, Indonesia, Mexico and the Reunion. Among these countries, Madagascar holds prominent position with an area of 25,550 ha under vanilla. Of late, Indonesia has started to promote vanilla with a production of 2,102 MT from 9,700 ha. The world market for vanilla beans is highly concentrated in a few developed countries. USA, France and Germany alone account for about 80% of world imports.

There has been no appreciable increase in area under vanilla cultivation in the traditional vanilla growing countries. Recent report is that in Madagascar, the vanilla crop was severely damaged by cyclone and the world's biggest producer thus sent the global prices of the flavouring agent, vanilla sky high. It is noticed that the area expansion in major vanilla producing countries during the past five years has been marginal, 40,020 ha in 1998 to only 40,846 ha in 2002). Hence, there is great scope for area expansion, production and export of vanilla in India.

The import of vanillin and ethyl vanillin together to India during 2000-01 was 404 tonnes. Even if only 10% of import of these synthetic substitutes is to be replaced with natural product, the requirement of vanilla beans would be 2020 tonnes @ 2% vanillin content. This is almost one half of the entire global production of vanilla beans. The present Indian production is only 65 tonnes. This indicates the great potential for vanilla development in India.

Spices Board, is currently implementing various schemes for the benefit of the interested growers which include

- Vanilla new planting programme
- Vanilla Certified Nursery scheme
 - Scheme for setting up of processing units
 - Vanilla Award Scheme and
 - Scheme for assisting producers for promoting exports of organic spices (including vanilla).

Thus, efforts to propagate and popularize vanilla in India have resulted in large number of farmers taking up vanilla cultivation particularly in Karnataka and Kerala. Research and Development activities of the Spices Board have given the required impetus and boost in

promoting vanilla cultivation. As a result, the

area under vanilla cultivation in India was about 1,800 ha with production of about 6 to 8 tonnes during 1999-2000, 20 tonnes during 2000-2001 and about 65 tonnes during 2001-02 season.

It is estimated that about 3,500 ha of area under vanilla will come under full bearing by 2009-10 in India, if the current rate of expansion continues. They will yield on an average about 300 kg/ha of processed beans. At the prevailing international market prices of US \$ 200/kg, the produce will fetch foreign exchange of Rs. 987 crores or US \$ 210 million annually.

Vanilla has become an alternative/companion crop in arecanut, coconut and coffee based cropping systems. At times when the market price of most of these plantation crops crashes with no prospects of their stabilization in the near future, this crop will support the growers.

As vanilla cultivation is gaining momentum, the Indian Society for Spices has proposed to organize an exclusive seminar on **Problems and Prospects of Cultivation of Vanilla in India**, at Sirsi, Uttar Kannada District in Karnataka sometime during April/May, 2004. The exact modalities of the programme are being worked out and the same will be intimated shortly.

National Seminar on New Perspectives in Spices, Medicinal and Aromatic Plants – A report

Indian Society for Spices in collaboration with ICAR Research Complex for Goa, Indian Institute of Spices Research, Calicut and Spices Board, Kochi organized the National Seminar on New Perspectives in Spices, Medicinal and Aromatic Plants at ICAR Research Complex Goa, during 27-29 November 2003.

The seminar was inaugurated by Sri. Sripad Nayak, Union Minister of State for Finance. The Hon'ble Minister launched the Society website www.spicesociety.org. Sri. Dayanand Mandrekar, Hon'ble Minister of Agriculture, Govt. of Goa presided over the function. Keynote address was delivered by Dr. J S Samra, DDG (NRM), ICAR. Over 200 delegates attended the Seminar in three days.

Two publications of the Society, the Abstract of papers of National Seminar on 'New Perspectives in Spices, Medicinal and Aromatic Plants' and the Proceedings of the National Seminar held at Calicut during 24-26 October 2002 on 'Strategies for Increasing Production and Export of Spices' were released during the occasion.
